a board game in which players score points in various ways; players are never eliminated from a Eurogame

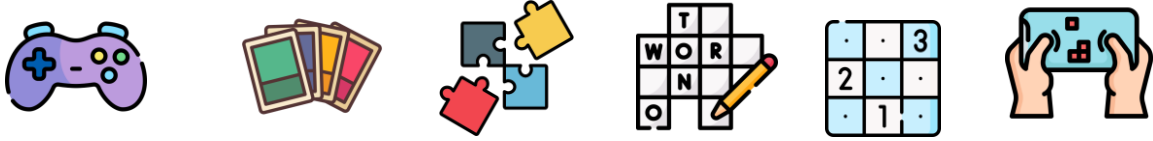
7. Discuss the questions.
