Drug Presentations – Semester 2 – 3Y

Guidelines & Marking Scheme

(9 minutes, 3 minutes per student)

- You will be in groups of three and will present weekly, except for week 8 & week 13.
- All presentations must be supported by catchy visual aids (only key words).
- To engage your audience, start with a compelling introduction (a story, a rhetorical question, a quote, a question..etc), maintain eye contact, use open body language, vary your tone, and end with a strong conclusion
- The presentation content should be equally divided between the three of you.
- For help with your presentation refer to pages 9 & 10 (giving advice) and pages 16 18 in your brochure.
- Choose a drug in one of the drug families: for example: allergenics, analgesics, antibiotics, anticholinergics, anticoagulants, antidepressants, antidiabetics, antihistamines, antipsychotics or others.
- You can give instructions about the use of your drug, dosage form, side effects and eventual adverse events, appropriate warnings and precautions, its administration route(s), why it is used (What ailments or diseases is it used to treat?), alternate treatments in case of stock rupture, its active ingredient (s) and their purpose, its inactive ingredients (if any) and their purpose, its mechanism of action and others.
 - Student 1: catchy introduction + part(s) of the presentation
 - Student 2: parts of the presentation
 - Student 3: part(s) of the presentation + strong conclusion
